It was the Theologian, Thomas Fuller who first put to print the phrase "The darkest hour is just before the dawn" and the old Spiritual tells us: "It was on an Easter Sunday morning, the angel rolled the stone away"

That's right! It was early in the morning - while it was still dark, the Gospel of John tells us - that the women went to the tomb where they had laid the body of Jesus on Good Friday. They found the enormous stone covering the tomb entrance rolled away and the cave? Empty! This was the Resurrection!

But hold on a minute. That was not the moment that Jesus rose from death, was it? Think about it. Jesus was not there when the stone was rolled away. The grave was already empty. Rolling away the stone did not let Jesus out - it let the disciples in to see He was no longer inside.

When you think about it, Jesus appeared to His disciples a couple of days later in that securely locked upper room without needing to open the door. And He didn't need anybody to free Him from that grave. A heavy stone was nothing to the one who had shattered the stronghold of that last enemy – death.


If Jesus was no longer in the tomb "early in the morning, when it was still dark" John 20:1, He must have been raised from the dead during the night, when nobody was about, when most people were asleep and His grieving disciples had locked themselves fearfully behind closed doors.


Long after the Easter hens are busy laying eggs for real and the Easter bunny has been put away for another year, I will remember that quiet, earth shattering resurrection - not in the blaze of sunrise but in the dark of night. The power of God at work, during THE darkest hour, when not one living soul expected it!

The darkest hour is just before the dawn. When nights are dark, when troubles seem insurmountable,

when I cringe with fear at what men can do - at these times I will remember my Jesus. His love and His life are stronger than death. And I will remember my God who is so often at work in the dark of night, when I least expect it.

#### Youth work at Elm Ridge

Although we currently have no Junior Church at Elm Ridge, we welcome young families all through the week – approaching 250 children attend various events at the church 5 days out of every 7!

Monday afternoons – we welcome Tiddlywinks (Mothers & Toddlers) for the afternoon. They meet in the hall (and when possible in the garden too) and play games, sing songs, undertake handicrafts, enjoy refreshments and generally have a happy time - the children bonding with other young children, and the young mothers getting to know each other. Indeed this group is so successful that pre-Covid they met a few times during school holidays at "Stay & Play" Sessions (held during the summer outside in the grounds), to which their older siblings were also welcome. Elm Ridge has a long tradition, going back over 80 years, of sponsoring youth uniformed organisations, who not only use our premises during the week, but also use the grounds for camping experience and the

like. Most of the groups are led by members of the church family, and they all take part in various church events during the year e.g. the Garden Party and other events, and quarterly Parade Services (normally on Palm Sunday, Chapel Anniversary, at Harvest Festival and on Remembrance Sunday).

#### 2nd Darlington Boys Brigade

The 2nd Darlington Boys Brigade Company meet at The Well on Friday evenings and attend Church Parades at Harrowgate Hill. We currently have 17 Junior boys (age 7 to 11), 5 Company boys (age 11 to

16) and 2 Seniors (16-18). We have 7 commissioned officers and 1 helper.

We were unable to meet for 15 months during Covid but managed to retain most of the boys and have had 6 new recruits since September. Unfortunately, we are now the only Boys Brigade Company left in Darlington & District with boys coming to us from as far afield as Barnard Castle, School Aycliffe and Thornaby, but the majority of the boys still come from the North Road area of Darlington.

Our aim is for the boys to have fun, learn new things, make new friends in a Christian environment. Since Christmas we have covered many topics including support for Ukraine, the night sky, respect and honesty, recycling, the Winter Olympics, baking scones and Knights & Dragons. The activities the boys take part in are part of an award structure and we are having our awards presentation night on Friday 20th May at The Well. Our 2 seniors are working towards their Queens Badge which is the highest honour in the Boys Brigade and we hope to present them in 2023. All of our Anchor Boys (age 5 to 7) grew up during Covid, so we don't have any boys of that age, if you know of any families in the area with boys of that age (or any age) please let them know about our Boys Brigade.

#### Work with Children and Families at The Pathway

Chat and Play: Our toddler group 'Chat and Play' reopened in September. 6 families attended our first session and were very positive about the experience. Since then, we have held weekly sessions which have attracted more families and our numbers have grown considerably. We now connect with 35 children from 27 different families. 'Chat and Play' provides a safe space where parents and carers can connect with one another, providing support, encouragement, and friendship. Each week we provide a range of activities for babies and toddlers as well as a snack time when everyone sits down together.

The Pathway Holiday at Home Club: During the Christmas, Easter and Summer school holidays we run a Holiday at Home Club. To support families during the holidays we give out activity bags containing craft resources and ideas, activity sheets and links to stories and songs. These are based on Biblical themes. In addition, we put together food packs containing recipes and ingredients to make a family meal.



Pumpkin party: In the October half term break, we held a Pumpkin Party for primary aged children plus some of our Chat and Play members. We used some of the resources from World Vision. There were games, crafts, songs stories and food. 19 children from 10 different families attended the party.



Christingle boxes and Nativity Bags: In December we had planned Christmas crafts, a party tea, and an interactive Nativity service for families from the community. However, in light of the Covid situation at the time, and after much thought and prayer, we felt we needed to cancel this event. Instead, we prepared Christingle boxes and Nativity bags for local families. 40 children from 22 families signed up for these. We were able to deliver them personally to each family just before Christmas.

#### THE LISTENING POST



Last academic year the Listening Post held over 1,500 listening and mentoring sessions supporting over 185 students. Appointments took place in 10 different venues. All this against a backdrop of Covid lockdowns, school bubbles and isolations. The provision of a safe space to talk about anything that might be troubling them enables many young people to cope.

The demand for sessions exceeds our provision, so we are arranging a new batch of Listening training at Darlington College to start in May (Thursday early evenings) for any individuals who would be interested in joining the Listening Post as a volunteer. #### **HURWORTH YOUTH PROJECT**



HYP is now the umbrella name for our activities in the Hurworth area. Unable to run both the Hurworth Friday Night Drop-In and the monthly Hang-Out (for primary school pupils) due to COVID, we reinvented ourselves and began a detached youth work project to engage with young people across the village on Friday evenings. This work has been really appreciated by the local

community and we have got to know many of the young characters Hurworth has to offer.

In November we re-established the Drop-In and also made the Hang-Out weekly. It seems to have struck a need with the Hang-Out now operating at capacity, with over 40 primary school pupils regularly attending. The Drop-In (for secondary school students) is building steadily with attendances now higher than immediately before Covid.

### **BREATHE YOUTH RETREAT**

The Breathe Youth Retreat is back this year following a COVID hiatus for 2 years. Breathe is our ecumenical retreat for young people that takes place in Edale (Peak District) during the summer holidays. The retreat allows young people the space to explore their spirituality and the Christian faith, through community, worship and contemplation. 

### "Welcome back!" - to Hebron in the West Bank John Howard reports on the reopening of EAPPI

For many years the Methodist Church has supported the World Council of Churches' Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel (EAPPI) as it trains interested people to accompany, observe, report and advocate. The programme was started in 2002 as a result of an appeal by the church leaders in Jerusalem for people from outside the land we call Holy, to "come see - go tell." Accompanying Palestinians, and Israeli peace activists - by internationals who have the privilege of being outsiders to the situation, and have the international networks where they report what they see - has the effect of reducing violence. It is known as "Protective Presence," and has been used to good effect in many conflict zones.

The global COVID pandemic meant that the teams of volunteers were withdrawn. In 2022 a new team were sent for the first time since the pandemic, largely consisting of experienced volunteers. As a result I am now serving in Hebron.

The city of Hebron, the second largest Palestinian City in the West Bank, has the dubious distinction of being the only city in the West Bank, outside Jerusalem, with Israeli settlements right in the centre of the city. As a result it is divided into two areas, H1 and H2. In H1 the Palestinian Authority is responsible. The Israeli Government handles security and planning in H2. Conditions there are amongst the most harsh faced by any Palestinians. Soldiers enter houses regularly, they count kitchen knives and even one out of place may mean an arrest. About 35,000 Palestinians live in H2 alongside something like 800 Israeli settlers. Protecting the settlers are approximately 2,000 Israeli soldiers, even though the settlers live there in contravention of international law (Article 49 of the 4th Geneva Convention). It makes for one of the most tense - and indeed volatile - cities in the West Bank.

Hebron's problems are not however limited to the H2 area. Israeli soldiers make frequent incursions into the Palestinian controlled area and they use tear gas, sound bombs and live fire by the Israeli Soldiers indiscriminately. As is often the case in communities traumatized by the military, there is also an increasing amount of violence within Palestinian communities.

This is the background to the lives of those who call Hebron home, and to our day by day experience too. As we arrived the weather was going from bad to worse, and on the second day here we had the heaviest snow fall for many years - so since there was little heating in the placement apartment - we really were cold!

In contrast the welcome from Palestinians has been so warm and friendly. Everywhere we walk - whether with the EAPPI vests on or not - we have people saying "Welcome back," everywhere we go, that is, except from soldiers and settlers in H2!

But life in Hebron is never predictable, no two days are the same. After witnessing a particularly violent incident, we passed through a police cordon and a young Palestinian smiled and said to us "Welcome to Hebron... have a nice day!"

Most mornings we help make sure children get to school safely. Children attending the Cordoba school have to pass through two checkpoints staffed by Israeli soldiers and walk along Shohada Street, once the main shopping street of Hebron - now more like a ghost town. It's an intimidating place for anyone, but for six, seven and eight year olds, and indeed some as young as four going to the kindergarten, (whose parents are not allowed to accompany them through the checkpoints) - facing this daily is an ongoing trauma. We walk with the children, talk to them, try out our Arabic on them, as they try their English! "Good Morning ... How are you?" Often their English is better than my Arabic! Sometimes it can be difficult - we have been pushed and kicked by settlers, and frequently stopped by the soldiers - but the staff of the school are clear that our presence helps the children. Indeed a previous head teacher has said it's thanks to outsiders like

us, providing some protection by our presence, that enabled the school to welcome more girls.

Hebron is not an easy place to be, but working as a team, with the support and prayers of many from across the world who support the programme, and by the grace of God, EAPPI is up and running again. We long for the time when it won't be necessary.



#### DISSENT IN DARLINGTON

A new book by archaeologist Peter Ryder, describing the nonconformist buildings of his home town, based on a survey he carried out in 2006. Taking a cut-off date of 1914, he traced exactly 50 chapels and meeting houses, 33 of them belonging to the various branches of Methodism. 21 of the 50 buildings remain as standing structures. The 64 page A5 book includes photographs of almost all of these, and maps showing their locations. A general introduction to the nonconformist history of the town – starting with the Society of Friends in the late 17<sup>th</sup> century – is followed by a gazetteer of the 50 buildings, and finally an analysis and discussion of their significance.

The first Methodist meeting in Darlington took place on Whit Tuesday in 1753, in a thatched cottage on Clay Row (now St Cuthbert's Way). John Wesley preached there in 1761, on the first of a number of visits to the town. By 1776 the group had rented a former schoolroom in Northgate,



and three years later their first meeting house (Bondgate 1) was constructed, which survive, in part, in the shop 'Poundstretcher'. The great chapel in the Saltyard was built in 1812/13.

Nonconformist buildings are a dwindling resource; since the 2004 survey Nestfield Methodist Church and Union Street Congregational have sadly been demolished, and others like the Salvation Army Citadel Northgate (seen in the cover illustration by Darlington artist John Longstaff) have been quite by their original congregations.



#### The Weardale Museum at High House Methodist Chapel, England, UK

## <u>The Creation of</u> The Methodist Tapestries Collection



In 2020, the Weardale Museum in Ireshopeburn acquired the neighbouring High House Chapel, which is now currently undergoing significant repair and refurbishment. As a flagship project, capable of attracting visitors from across the world to the proposed *Weardale Heritage Centre*, the Museum has launched the *Methodist Tapestries Project* with the intention of portraying key elements of the story of Methodism through the medium of embroidery. As High House was, until 2019, the oldest purpose-built chapel in the UK to be in continuous weekly use since its inception in 1760, it will be a particularly appropriate home for an artwork showing the history of Methodism. The completed Methodist Tapestries Collection will be displayed as part of a dedicated exhibition area once the Chapel is fully restored (expected to be in early 2022).

#### The work so far

Phase 1 involves the creation of an artwork which, interpreted through 15 panels, tells the story of the High House Methodist Chapel since its opening in 1760. These designs are the nucleus of the collection, in that they focus on the more local stories; each panel measures 50cm x 50cm with the artwork area measuring 40cm x 40cm. These 15 panels have been transferred to Angus Twill Linen, and some have now been completed while others are in progress. These will form the core of the collection which it is hoped will feature over 100 local Methodist stories from around the UK

#### **Continuing participation**

Photos of work on various panels can be seen on our Facebook and Instagram pages, as well as sometimes featuring on the Weardale Museum's Twitter feed.

Anyone with a love of needlework, and who has previously completed a sewing project of any kind, is welcome to participate. It is possible to research and design a panel, with assistance if needed, or to take on an existing design, and technical embroidery support is available as required.
