## 'Be still and know that I am God' (Psalm 46:11)

All of us have favourite stories. Stories are of many kinds and serve different purposes. It may be a story from the past which helps to illuminate our sense of who we are; or a funny story which allows us to laugh at ourselves or poke fun at the powerful or things which are absurd; or they may be stories which help to locate our story in a much bigger story – like the stories of Jesus. Sometimes though, stories help us to orientate ourselves as we adjust to the moment we are living through. One journalist recently argued that we



are living through a time of 'perma-crisis' with the pandemic just the beginning of a series of crises which seem to have struck us all at once – war in Ukraine; the energy crisis; the cost of living; the impacts of climate change, and so on. Sometimes life can feel like Corporal Jones running around in circles shouting, 'Don't panic!', when it's clear that's precisely what he is doing! All of this has an impact which is both physical and spiritual. In such a situation it's essential that we orientate ourselves and find a still, deep centre from which we can begin to take some first steps into the future however frightening or disconcerting it may seem. The story of Elijah in I Kings 19 is a story which may be a good place from which to begin.

If you don't know the story, do take the chance to read it. Elijah is on the run, afraid for his life, and goes into the wilderness where he feels dejected and forlorn. God meets his immediate needs and Elijah goes to a mountain – a lot of important stories in the Bible seem to happen on mountains. He expects that he will meet God in the drama of an earthquake, or in the stirring of a great wind or fire. But no. God comes to him in the silence, in a gentle murmur. This encounter with God is enough to re-centre and equip him for the journey that lies ahead.

However, you read the story, it seems to me to have an important lesson for us as we pass through this period of crisis. We must engage with the practical realities that we and our neighbours face in the challenging months ahead. But we must also find a still centre in which to know God, re-orientate ourselves and deal with some of the spiritual, mental health and emotional impacts of successive crises. It is something which we need to find for ourselves but which we may also be able to offer our communities alongside practical support and a challenging of injustice.

Margaret Silf tells a story about a group of explorers who set off on a journey accompanied by local guides who knew the terrain well and were willing to carry the equipment. They travelled together for three days, making good progress. If they kept up this pace they would surely reach their destination on time. But on the fourth day as the explorers waited to set off, they noticed that the guides weren't with them but were sitting resting in a shady spot. When challenged about what they were doing, they said simply: 'We have marched for three days and we have met your schedule. Now it is time for us to rest and let our souls catch up with us.'

We also need rest, space, an opportunity for re-orientation and for our souls to catch up with us. As our churches and communities live through a period of crisis, I pray that we may find the still centre from which we might live and be equipped for the journey which lies ahead of us.

#### A little bit of Palestine at MIddleton-in-Teesdale

For seven days, before the Bank Holiday prints of the work created by the Palestinian artist Nisreen Azzeh where exhibited at the Pathway. This was seen as an opportunity to reach out to people who might not usually come into the building, or usually to consider anything about the conflict in Israel Palestine.

Writing this while the event was taking place its good to record that everyone who has come in so far has been very complimentary about the exhibition. There have been good conversations about the art and considerable comment about how unfortunate it is that we hear so little about the Israel Palestine conflict in the news.

So far, and the bank holiday itself is still ahead and perhaps will be busier, we have not been overrun with visitors, however those who have come in have made the work worthwhile. One comment I had from someone outside the church community was "Not all wars are caused by religions." I still don't know what to make of that one!

During September and October we might be having two visitors from Palestine. On 21st September Hamed Tamimi. He is a remarkable person who lives in Hebron and founded Hebron International Resource Network, (HIRN). Hamed is speaking at Elvet Methodist Church in Durham on 21st and I am hoping to have an informal meeting for him in the circuit. Details coming later.

Then in early October I am hoping to host Daoud and Gihan Nassar. The Nassar family are the recipients of the 2017 World Methodist Peace Prize for their work in forming the "Tent of Nations." Because of the pressures they are under they have yet to confirm their visit but I hope that they will be speaking at venues across the UK.

A typical family order would be £7.50, an individual would be £4. An extra large family would be £15.

Step 3 - We'll send you a text every week to see if you want an order. All you have to do is reply "YES" to the text by 10am the day before collection and we'll deliver your order to your chosen hub.

#### **FOOD BANKS:**

#### **Trussel Trust**

The main collection point for Teesdale for the Trussel Trust is The Well, West Auckland. Donations from the following are delivered there for distribution:

 $\textbf{Barnard Castle}: \ Barnard \ Castle \ Method ist \ Church; St \ Mary's \ Anglican \ Church; Heron \ Foods \ supermarket.$ 

Middleton in Teesdale: The Pathway; The Co-op; UTASS

**Staindrop**: approximately every six weeks Mark Bagnall advertises a collection in the village and then collects and delivers the donations.

**Storehouse Food Bank:** run by Influence Church using Barnard Castle Methodist Church premises, The Witham being their collection point

TCR Hub runs the Teesdale Care Package Campaign. Through the FareShare scheme local supermarkets inform TCR of any surplus fresh food, volunteers pick up and pack this food and it is then advertised on Facebook for residents in the Barnard Castle area to collect from the Hub. The TCR also has a Care Pack whereby donations are deposited at Lidl, Morrisons and Tesco and TCR volunteers collect, pack and distribute to vulnerable residents throughout the Dale. Referrals are made by Social Services, the Police etc or by self-referral.

#### LUNCH CLUBS:

The Association of Teesdale Day Clubs provides support to mostly, but not exclusively, elderly residents in Teesdale villages to combat isolation, improve health and wellbeing, and to provide a source of information and support. Clubs meet regularly, usually on a weekly basis and normally from 11.30-2pm.

Members pay £6 for a 3 course lunch cooked on the premises by a qualified Chef. All of the premises used have wheelchair access, either level or ramps and member transport can usually be arranged.

Clubs meet regularly, usually on a weekly basis and normally from 11.30-2pm. Meetings take place at the following venues:

Barnard Castle Cricket Club, every Tuesday from 11:30-2pm.

Cotherstone Village Hall, every Wednesday from 11:30-2pm.

Middleton-in-Teesdale every Wednesday in the Masonic Hall except the third one in the month which is at the Pathway Middleton-in-Teesdale from 11:30-2pm.

Staindrop Scarth Hall, every Tuesday from 11:30-2pm.

Winston Village Hall, every Thursday from 11:30-2pm for both Gainford and Winston

#### A Series tracing The Pathway people from the Newbiggin beginnings to the present.

## Part 3: John Wesley & his preachers continued

Whilst the Methodist movement was growing around Newbiggin, the work was harder down the road in Middleton. Many preachers passed through including John Wesley and saw it as their duty to preach there. We need to remember that this new movement was seen by many to be at least troublesome, or at worst a catalyst for revolution. It took decades before the good living and morals of these so called 'Methodists' was recognised as a force for the good. Indeed, it has sometimes been said that were it not for the Methodist movement revolution could easily have overtaken Britain in the latter part of the eighteenth century.

Persecution in Middleton: Persecution seems to have been commonplace in Middleton. Whit Sunday 1752: A preacher from Leeds named Greenwood intended to deliver his message in Middleton in a house front at the top of Hude. A mob gathered, sounding a horn and threatening him. Matthew Rowell from Allendale was present and endeavoured to draw the hostility away from Mr Greenwood. Matthew was thrown over the wall parapet on to Hude and dragged down the bank with the intention of throwing him into Hudeshope Beck. One Peter Bainbridge came out from his dwelling with an old sword to defend Matthew, but some other Methodists restrained him and persuaded him to hang his old sword back up on his house wall. Just then Joshua Addison and Joshua Hammond arrived from Barnard Castle to hear the preacher. They intervened with Addison exclaiming: 'I'm one of them, I'm one of them!' He successfully drew attention from Matthew to themselves and took the anger instead, though thankfully not sustaining any serious injuries. Addison did however loose his new hat! It is reported that the persecuting group later went to St. Mary's church and received communion! Mr Greenwood preached that evening at Newbiggin to a peaceful crowd.





Preacher Matthew Rowell (brother of Jacob) from Allendale was dragged down Hude by a hostile group.

Is this 1742 built former Inn on Hude the parapet that Matthew Rowell was pushed over?

Newbiggin Chapel: It was perhaps one reason why the 'Methodists' around Newbiggin decided to build their own Meeting House that was not someone's house or farm rented from The Duke of Cleveland. Many had been persecuted as a consequence. This was the first purpose-built meeting place in Teesdale (ahead of Barnard Castle, Lunedale, and Cotherstone). A site was secured for £5 from Robert Robinson facing directly on to what was then the main road through Teesdale. The Meeting House was built from 1759 with a mixture of local stone to a plain design, at a cost of £61 138 5d. It opened in 1760 and was said to be able to hold 200, though that must have been quite a squash! The deed signatories were three preachers: Jacob Rowell, Christopher Hopper and Matthew Lowes; plus four leadminers: Thomas Allinson of Bowlees, John Ridley and James Ainsley of Woodside, and John Spence of Sievy Lee. The four described themselves as 'The Christian Society or Congregation of Protestants dwelling within the limits and boundaries of Newbiggin...commonly called Methodists.' Its interesting that as part of work to convert the chapel to a house in 2020, the original front door (blocked up and at the back after the 1860 enlargements) has had a window inserted. Giving us a better idea of how the original building appeared.

**Newbiggin strength:** Jacob Rowell's record for the Christmas Quarter 1760 shows the strength of the work around Newbiggin, here called 'Teesdale'. A 1764 record shows that Newbiggin was centre for the work from Langdon Beck to Middleton.

**Lunedale:** Our first record of Methodists preaching in Lunedaleis at Wisehill (now Wythes Hill): Mr Edward Raine's home. He was consequently much persecuted by his neighbours. One of the new converts in Lunedale was a man who frequently beat his wife and had a 'savage' disposition. God softened his heart and he was transformed. Unfortunately, he was soon after apprehended (perhaps for previous crimes) and pressed for a soldier. Nothing more was heard of him. Lune is listed in the 1760 Dales Circuit record with the other Yorkshire societies.

This instalment is shorter than I intended it to be (did I hear thank goodness!). Next month we will look at John Wesley's visits and continue the story. Who were the incomers from Derbyshire? Will the love of God eventually touch a few more of the hearts in Middleton! When does Methodism reach Cotherstone? **Find out next month!**
